#### Attendance

#### Quality Teaching and Learning

#### Writing

The Literacy team has conducted the first of their curriculum planning days for this term. Program Coordinator Natalie Worthington will be presenting information to this meeting.

#### Program Coordinator: Pathways and Transitions

This level 3 School Administrator process has been conducted and it is my pleasure to formally announce that the successful candidate was Deborah Kempton. Deb is currently in a similar position at Broome SHS and is an enormously experienced VET operative. We look forward to working with her on our exciting journey towards Years 11 and 12.

#### **Building Project**

The move to the new Technologies centre has taken place. It has been an epic move as there was some 43 years of materials and equipment to be gone through in the old centre.

A garage sale was undertaken by the D&T staff in week 10 of Term 3 with just under \$9000 being raised. The laser cutter gets closer!

At the same time, the Student Services team moved into their new quarters – the old Administration area. New offices have been created, and while not ideal, they are learning to use the space effectively.

The next phase will be the Clontarf refurbishment of the old Student Services space. This space is currently being used by the technicians and is largely empty.

The verdict on the new Cafeteria by the community is 'wow'. Strict rules have been enforced and as we see how the space is used, rules will be adjusted accordingly.

#### Humanities and Social Sciences Tour to China

This tour was an excellent opportunity for our students to experience China first hand. From 13-25 September, 18 students accompanied by Head of Learning Area HASS Colleen Byrne, Head of Learning Area Science Andrew Hough, HASS teacher Tim Collier and myself, travelled to China.

We left on Thursday 14 September at 00:35 and flew into Singapore at 06:30. Our connecting flight took us to Beijing and we got to the hotel about 20:30 – a long day for all. Over the next three days we visited the Forbidden City, Temple of Heaven, experienced Chinese calligraphy, walked the Ming Tombs, visited a family in the hutongs, and climbed the Great Wall.

It was in Beijing that we found the 'insect' stalls and most of us sampled the 'delights' of scorpions on sticks. The really brave tried starfish and the really stupid tried tarantula – that was not a hit!

From Beijing we travelled on the bullet train to Xian (1000km) at a speed of 300 km per hour. An overnight train journey took just 6 hours. Once there we cycled on the ancient city walls, and visited the Terracotta Warrior conservation project. The scale of this project is breathtaking and the story of how they came to be is evidence of the power and wealth of the ancient emperors.







From Xian we boarded the train again to Chengdu (800 km) which is the home of the international conservation effort to save the Giant Pandas. This was a once in a lifetime opportunity to see this rare and endangered species in a conservation setting. Pandas are solitary creatures, breed slowly and eat selectively and the numbers in the wild are very small. We were at the conservation area early to avoid the massive crowds that came later in the day. We also visited the ancient town of Huanglongxi situated on the Li and Jan rivers. This has been a marketplace for 1700 years.

Chengdu is also the birthplace of Taoism and we rode a cable car to the base of a temple which appeared to be in the clouds on Munt Qingcheng. Some stayed at the cable car base and the rest of us climbed to the top to the temple and left prayer ribbons to blow to the four winds. From this temple in the clouds, we could see snow covered mountains in the distance.

We then flew to Shanghai (1900 km) – which is the largest city in the world – our students were amazed that the population of Shanghai is roughly that of Australia.

Shanghai is a bustling metropolis and we saw this from the Oriental Pearl TV Tower which sits in the city skyline.

We visited markets, gardens and has a city tour. The tour finished with a day at Shanghai Disney – from where we flew home.









The students were amazing and made the tour a fantastic success. In Twelve days, a group of students from Geraldton visited the two largest cities in the world, travelled overland on one of the largest countries and ate bugs!

# Honour their Spirit

Remembrance Day has a special significance in 2018.


Sunday, 11 November 2018 marks the 100th anniversary of the Armistice which ended the First World War (1914–18).

One hundred years ago, on 11 November 1918, the guns of the Western Front fell silent after four years of continuous warfare. With their armies retreating and close to collapse, German leaders signed an Armistice, bringing to an end the First World War. From the summer of 1918, the five divisions of the Australian Corps had been at the forefront of the allied advance to victory. Beginning with their stunning success at the battle of Hamel in July, they helped to turn the tide of the war at Amiens in August, followed by the capture of Mont St Quentin and Pèronne, and the breaching of

German defences at the Hindenburg Line in September. By early October the exhausted Australians were withdrawn from battle. They had achieved a fighting reputation out of proportion to their numbers, but victory had come at a heavy cost. They suffered almost 48,000 casualties during 1918, including more than 12,000 dead.

The 11<sup>th</sup> Battalion AIF. The first to be formed in WA at the outbreak of the war. The first ashore at Gallipoli and pivotal to the later taking of Lone Pine. Devastated in France in 1916 at the Battle of Poziers; on the receiving end the heaviest artillery bombardment of the war. And in all the significant battles on the Western Front until the end of the war. Wiped-out five times over. The reinforcements were killed and then those that replaced them and so on. D company was mostly made up of Geraldton and Mid-West lads.














#### Young Writer's Workshop


JWC Library hosts the authors for the Year 6 and 7 & 8 workshops, while Years 9 to 12 attend workshops at Geraldton Secondary College.





The Tree of Life program is a hopeful and inspiring approach to work with children, young people and adults who have experienced hard times. In Tree of Life we use a tree as a metaphor for life. Participants draw their own trees and are given the opportunity to reflect on where they come from, where they are now, where they are going and how these 'trees' form a forest. This model gives the opportunity for non-traumatic discussions in the group. It is also a trauma preventative program the gives hope in uncertainty.





