Year 11 Course Counselling

This process has been completed across the Year 11(2021) cohort. Course counsellors this year have included: Helen Lydon, Neil Wyatt, Tim Collier, Nat Worthington, Deb Kempton and current Year 10 Year Coordinator, Rebecca Bright. To date, the school has received many applications from current Year 10 students to cross boundary and stay at CBSHS. Notifications will be posted from 25 August. While the influx of applications has potentially grown the ATAR candidate pool, ATAR course offerings for 2021 are still under consideration.

Some subjects will still be offered via SIDE, where potential numbers of students are still too small to deliver face to face. During Week 4, Chris Freegard School Officer, has been appointed as the SIDE supervisor for the duration of 2020.

Geraldton Lighthouse Project Partnership of Schools

The Geraldton Lighthouse project is a partnership of schools, developed to support the growing number of students diagnosed with Autism Spectrum



Disorder(ASD). The project aims to help the participating schools support the individual needs of students from K-12 who are at risk of disengagement, underachievement and/or who are at risk of disengagement, underachievement and/or who have significant difficulties with adaptive behaviour. This project is designed to implement whole of school best practice and evidence-based learning.

The key schools in this pilot are: Waggrakine, Wandina and Geraldton Primary Schools and Champion Bay Senior High School (as a transitional partner).

This is a targeted initiative with allocated funding that supports the salaries of a Program Coordinator and two key support teachers to drive improvement. This funding is guaranteed for four years. In addition, the School of Special Educational Needs: Disability will also fund a Level 3 Program Coordinator to work alongside the project Program Coordinator until the end of the 2022 school year. There will also be funding to support minor works at the schools.

At CBSHS, we have been looking to maximise unused spaces to create sensory spaces, break out teaching areas and staff workspaces. Key among our considerations are currently unused reflection spaces, storerooms, and the Literacy Centre, currently being used for SIDE. We have another location in mind for SIDE.

Engagement Program 2021

In the aftermath of COVID, several students have severe attendance behaviours.

Our concern is that these students will not re-engage to gain their WACE and will continue to 'drift' further from the education system without any qualifications or job readiness. To attempt to alleviate this from happening, this proposed program looks at providing an educational program for students who are choosing to stay enrolled at CBSHS and are working towards completing a SBT, VET certification and/or are working towards an entry-level pathway.

This program will be suitable for students who are aiming to:

- Increase attendance in Year 11 and 12
- Attain a WASSA with recognition of studied courses and completed programs
- Complete a SBT/ASBT
- Complete a VET certificate
- Increase Literacy and Numeracy skills
- Complete a Work Ready program
- Complete a Life Beyond School program
- Complete a community service project and/or work experience.

This program is being designed by Jess McLaren.

Good Standing Policy

This policy has been delivered in detail to the current Year 11 students. With COVID, many school events have already been cancelled, including Country Week, HASS International Tour and camps to Perth. However, with the relaxing of restrictions between regions in WA, the easing of social events and gatherings, Tim Collier, Year 11 Coordinator is looking at a formal function for the Year 11 students to finish the year. At present, suspension rates remain very low amongst the Year 11 cohort, however, attendance and submission of assessments remain an issue for some students. The policy will be delivered to the earlier years over the duration of Term Three.

Parent Teacher evenings

A second Parent-Teacher evening for Year 11 will be held during Week 8, with Years 7-10 in Term 4 (Week 2). Information regarding bookings will be sent out – please watch out for these.

Positive Behavior Support Committee

The Positive Behaviour Support Committee is excited to announce that teachers will be rolling out new Respect, Aspire, Resilience rewards to students.

GRAMS Park upgrade

CBSHS has been approached by CoGG to have input into the upgrade to GRAMS park. This is an awesome opportunity for our students to work within a public art project. Mike McGillivray and Steph Alcock have also been consulted here. On Tuesday and Wednesday Week 6 during Form in the Dance Studio, a group of students from Years 7-9 will be working with the City of Greater Geraldton to provide their input into the design and layout of the GRAMS Park upgrade project.

Deadly Sista Girlz

CBSHS and the Wirrpanda Foundation are planning an opening and launch of the program based at CBSHS. This will be on Wednesday 23 September (Week 10). There will be more information to follow on this.

School Development Day

Year 7 Excursion



HUMANITIES & SOCIAL SCIENCES



It has been an awesome term for HaSS. Besides the fantastic learning that is going on in the classroom, we have had the opportunity to be involved in a wide range of activities.

The Year 10 group had their Geography fieldwork earlier this term, where they observed and recorded through field sketches, the coastal erosion happening around Geraldton. The students were lucky to have Mr Evans accompany them as he lives in Drummonds and could provide first-hand experiences as to how the coastal erosion has impacted the Drummonds community. Mr Evans also pointed out some of the residual landmarks indicating where the coast had originally been. The students then made their way to Midalia beach to see the reconstruction that the City of Greater Geraldton council has recently completed.

A group of selected students were invited to join the school team participating in The Evatt Competition. Champion Bay SHS was lucky to be able to host the event this year with 9 teams competing. The Evatt Trophy Competition engages high school students across Australia in world affairs and issues through debating mock Security Council resolutions from the position of an assigned Country. In pairs, delegates were assigned a Country and one resolution a week before the competition. They then develop their stance on the prepared resolution from the perspective of their assigned Country. On the day of their round, they debate, amend and finally vote on the prepared resolution and also one impromptu resolution. After a day of heated debate and discussion, the team that will be representing the Midwest Region in Perth later this term is Aleesya Amirizal of Champion Bay Senior High School and Thea Volgerts from Geraldton Senior High School. Congratulations Aleesya and Thea and well done to the other students who participated.

The extension classes from Years Seven to Ten have recently completed the National Geography Competition, in which they answered a range of Geography based questions from various aspects of their curriculum. This competition is usually held in term one but as a result of the school closures across the country due to COVID 19 it was delayed until this term. We are eagerly waiting for the results to see how well our students have done.

Ms Clarke is assisting a group of students who will be competing in the ASX School Share Market Game from the 27 August. Students receive a virtual \$50,000 they can invest over 10 weeks, in 220 companies listed on the ASX. The prices students buy and sell at are the same as they would get in the live market, so this is as close to real-life share trading as you can get. The winners receive \$600 real money.

For the first time this year, we celebrated HaSS week in week three, with a week-long celebration of all things HaSS. CLONTARF FUTURE MECHANICS OF OUR REGION



On Wednesday the 29th of July, 9 of our Year 10 Academy members embarked on another milestone in their educational careers for the next 2 terms, as they started a Certificate 1 in Automotive Vocational Preparation at Central Regional TAFE WA, Geraldton campus.

This course has mainly a practical nature, compromising of workshop activities and some classroom time. It is a hands-on entrylevel course that will equip the boys with, how a car works, basic repairs, working safely, working in a team environment, organising plans and problem-solving.



We kitted our Academy members from head to toe with PPE safety gear which includes steel cap boots, workpants / jeans and a polo top. The boys get to school on Wednesday morning by 8.15 am; have some breakfast and then start getting themselves ready for an 8.45 am meeting at the CBSHS Careers Central room from there we all head over to the TAFE Campus.

There is a lot of support for our members at Central Regional TAFE as there are services, lounges and a kitchen in the Aboriginal Learning Centre that we are allowed to access. It is very similar to our Clontarf Academy rooms, as all people accessing it must treat it with respect and leave it the way that they found it. They also have an Aboriginal Student Support services team dedicated to providing outstanding support for Aboriginal students and staff.

The boys have just finished the second week of this Certificate and the boys have said that they enjoyed it more than the first session as they were more hands-on and got to look under the hood of a car for the first time. At the commencement of this 20-week course, we would love nothing more than to get all 9 of our Academy members over the line and obtain this qualification. Dedication to being on time and not missing any sessions, hard work and perseverance will help us get this done.
